PUBLIC SAFETY UPDATE

Jason Caban, St. Johns County Sheriff's Office Corrections Division Director, reported on spring break, including assisting the Jacksonville Beach Sheriff's Office with a mutual aid request; and on The Players Championship (TPC) traffic impacts. He also provided an update on the Corrections Division facility and medical inspections. Additionally, he announced the opening of the local Opened Arms Recovery office.

Jeremy Robshaw, St. Johns County Fire Rescue Chief of Communications, provided an update on Lieutenant Justin Dailey's progress, the services provided at The Players Championship, and spring break safety.

The Board members expressed their gratitude for the services provided by law enforcement and first responders.

1. Request for approval to continue the acquisition process for North Beach Utilities, Inc., Water/Wastewater System, and to schedule the required public hearing. On August 23, 2023, North Beach Utilities, Inc. (NBU), a private water and wastewater utility system in St. Johns County, expressed its interest in selling to St. Johns County Utility (SJCUD). The NBU franchise provides water and wastewater services to approximately 1,400 customers in Vilano Beach (service area and location map attached). SJCUD has reviewed operational and financial feasibility information and determined that the acquisition meets all County requirements outlined in Resolution No. 2005-39, related to the utility acquisition policy. SJCUD requests approval from the Board of County Commissioners (Board) to continue the acquisition process by completing its utility assessments; noticing a public hearing to determine whether the acquisition is in the public interest, as required by Section 125.3401, Florida Statute, to be held on May 7, 2024; and negotiating and preparing a proposed Purchase and Sale Agreement for acquisition of the NBU system, subject to Board approval as part of the presentation on May 7

Neal Shinkre, St. Johns County Utilities Director, presented the details of the request.

Dean spoke on the history of private water and wastewater facilities, the importance of supporting the project for the long-term integrity of the system, and funding concerns.

Public Comment: Carol Anderson and B.J. Kalaidi provided public comment.

Motion by Dean, seconded by Whitehurst, carried 5/0, to authorize the county administrator, or designee, to complete utility assessments for the proposed acquisition of North Beach Utilities, Inc., by St. Johns County; to negotiate and prepare a proposed Purchase and Sale Agreement for said acquisition, with the assistance of the county attorney and subject to Board approval; and to notice the public interest hearing required under Section 125.3401, Florida Statutes, for the regularly scheduled Board of County Commissioners meeting on May 7, 2024.

Motion by Joseph, seconded by Whitehurst, carried 5/0, to adopt Resolution No. 2024-126, authorizing the notice required by Section 336.10, F.S., for a Public Hearing on April 16, 2024, at 9:00 a.m., or at a date and time as soon thereafter as possible, to hear a request for the vacation of a portion of unopened Second Street North right-of-way (VACROA 2023-04, Ferrell-Becker Petition).

2. Confirmation of Sean McGee as Fire Chief. Acting Fire Chief Sean McGee is a 25-year member of St. Johns County Fire Rescue who has served the department in the operational ranks of Firefighter, Engineer, Lieutenant, Captain, and Battalion Chief. Prior to being appointed Acting Fire Chief in October of 2023, Sean held the rank of Battalion Chief for 11 years. Chief McGee holds a bachelor's degree from Northern Michigan University in Public Relations/Communications. In addition, Chief McGee holds an extensive list of fire service and public safety specific certifications

Joy Andrews, County Administrator, presented the details of the St. Johns County Fire Chief confirmation.

Sean McGee, St. Johns County Fire Rescue Chief, expressed his gratitude for the privilege to serve the community of St. Johns County.

<u>Public Comment</u>: Ed Slavin, Michele McDonnell, and William Fisher provided public comment.

Motion by Arnold, seconded by Dean, carried 5/0, to confirm Sean McGee as the Fire Chief for St. Johns County Fire Rescue.

3. Public Hearing - REZ 2023-20, Dobbs Road Plant Rezoning. Request to rezone approximately 3.85 acres of land from Industrial Warehousing (IW) to Heavy Industrial (HI), with conditions to allow for all uses currently allowed within the IW zoning district in addition to Concrete Block Manufacturing, specifically located at 2035 Dobbs Road. The Planning and Zoning Agency heard this request at its regularly scheduled public hearing on February 15, 2024, and recommended denial, with a vote of 5 to 1 (Green dissenting). Agency members and the public discussed compatibility with the adjacent properties and mitigation of noise, traffic, and air pollution from the subject site

Regular Agenda Item 3 was continued to April 16, 2024.

4. Public Hearing - PUD 2023-20, State Road 16 Medical and Commercial Planned Unit Development (PUD). Request to rezone approximately two acres of land from Residential Single-Family 3 (RS-3) to PUD to allow for a maximum 19,000 square feet of freestanding emergency room, medical office, and ancillary commercial/office space. The property is located on the northeastern corner of Woodlawn Road and State Road 16. The Planning and Zoning Agency heard this request at its regularly scheduled public hearing on February 15, 2024, and recommended approval, with a vote of 6 to 0, agency member Peter was absent

The Board disclosed ex parte communication.

Ellen Avery-Smith, Esq., Rogers Towers, P.A., representing the applicant, presented the details of the request. She responded to concerns regarding overnight beds/stays and ambulance transfers.

Public Comment: There was none.

Motion by Dean, seconded by Alaimo, carried 5/0, to enact Ordinance No. 2024-12, PUD 2023-20, State Road 16 Medical and Commercial PUD, based upon nine findings of fact, as provided in the staff report.

5. Public Hearing - REZ 2023-31, Biera Mar Lots. Request to rezone approximately .47 acres of land, located along the eastern side of A1A South, north of East Palmetto Avenue, from Commercial General (CG) to Residential Single-Family (RS-3), to allow for three single-family homes on each of the three platted lots. This request was heard by the Planning and

Zoning Agency at its regularly scheduled public hearing on Thursday, February 15, 2024, and was recommended for approval, 6-0

There was no ex parte communication.

Bill Miller, Coldwell Banker Premier Properties, representing the applicant, presented the details of the request. Miller responded to the intended use of the homes.

<u>Public Comment</u>: Heather Harley Davidson, Charlie Hunt, Michele McDonnell, Ed Slavin, and Suzanne Clulow provided public comment.

Miller responded to the public's concerns on other zoning in the area, the homes being used as Airbnb rentals, and the removal of the billboard when the home is built.

Joseph expressed her concerns on the zoning and traffic impacts.

Motion by Alaimo, seconded by Dean, carried 4/1, with Joseph dissenting, to enact Ordinance No. 2024-13, approving REZ 2023-31, Biera Mar Lots, based on four findings of fact, as provided in the staff report.

6. First Reading of proposed ordinance to establish a boating restricted area at the double-blind curve on Pablo Creek. Section 327.46(1)(c), Florida Statutes (F.S.), authorizes the Board of County Commissioners to establish certain boating restricted areas, by ordinance, on waterways of the state within the county subject to a finding by the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) that the boating restricted area is necessary to protect public safety. Specifically, Section 327.46(1)(c) 2.a., F.S. provides for a slow speed, minimum wake boating restricted area, if the area is within 300 feet of a confluence of water bodies presenting a blind corner, a bend in a narrow channel or fairway, or such other area if an intervening obstruction to visibility may obscure other vessels or other users of the waterway. At its October 3, 2023, meeting, the Board gave consensus to proceed with the FWC application to establish a slow speed, minimum wake boating restricted area at the double-blind curve on Pablo Creek. On February 20, 2024, FWC approved the application and attached ordinance. Pursuant to section 125.66(3), F. S., a business impact estimate was prepared

Kealey West, Assistant County Attorney, presented the details of the proposed ordinance.

7. County Administrator Contract. The Board engaged GovHR United States of America (USA) to conduct a national search to hire a new county administrator. The Board appointed a selection committee to interview top-tier candidates and make a recommendation to the Board regarding which candidates to interview. GovHR USA provided the selection committee with the list of all applicants, as well as a recommended shortlist. The selection committee met in a public meeting to review this information and provided its guidance regarding which candidates are recommended for in-person

interviews with the Board. On October 31, 2023, the Board selected Joy Andrews as County Administrator. This item represents the contract between Joy Andrews and the County to serve as County Administrator

Sarah Arnold, Chair of the Board of County Commissioner, presented the details of the contract.

<u>Public Comment</u>: B.J. Kalaidi, Charlie Hunt, Ann-Marie Evans (Exhibit A), Ed Slavin, Heather Harley Davidson, Michele McDonnell, Nicole Crosby, Suzanne Clulow, and Carol Anderson provided public comment.

The Board members expressed their positions on the contract.

Joseph requested Brandon J. Patty, Clerk of the Circuit Court and Comptroller, to explain the ordinance that handles contract provisions. Patty responded that he would refer to the county attorney for information on the history. Discussion ensued on County Ordinance No. 2010-47, regarding the history and language, concerns about political influences, the contract negotiation, and compliance with the Sunshine Law disclosure.

Motion by Arnold, seconded by Whitehurst, carried 4/1, with Joseph dissenting, to approve the terms and conditions of the Professional Services Agreement between St. Johns County and the County Administrator Joy Andrews, and to authorize the chairman, or designee, to execute the agreement on behalf of the County.

He mentioned the Presidential Preference Primary Election and commended Vickey Oaks and her staff for their hard work. He also spoke on perception versus reality regarding the development of St. Johns County, and expressed holiday sentiments.

Dean reported on working with Bill Sadowski and provided a history of his accomplishments regarding establishing the State Housing Initiatives Partnership (SHIP), which serves as the revenue source for affordable housing.

Commissioner Arnold

Arnold congratulated Sean McGee and Joy Andrews on their new positions, thanked the public safety teams for their contributions to the success of The Players Championship, and expressed holiday sentiments.

COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT
